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Author Guidelines – FAGROPEC Journal

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PRESENTATION

The FAGROPEC Journal of the Faculty of Agricultural Sciences at the University of the Amazon aims to disseminate technical and scientific advances generated at universities, research centers, and institutions in areas related to agricultural production systems and natural conservation. The journal publishes a biannual digital volume containing articles in Spanish, Portuguese, or English.

The publication targets students, professionals, and other interested parties in fields such as veterinary medicine, animal science, biology, public health, epidemiology, agronomy, agroecology, and other animal and agricultural sciences, providing an academic forum essential for the formation of critical and analytical professionals.

TYPES OF ARTICLES

The journal accepts the following types of manuscripts in Spanish, Portuguese, or English:

Scientific and Technological Research Articles: Documents presenting original research results in detail. Required structure: Title (in Spanish and Portuguese or English), Abstract and keywords (in Spanish and Portuguese or English), Introduction, Methodology (Study area, materials and methods, ethical implications, and statistical analysis, as applicable), Results and Discussion, Conclusions, Acknowledgments, and References.

Review Articles: Results of completed research that analyze, systematize, and integrate published or unpublished findings in a particular field of science or technology to account for advances and trends. Should follow the same structure as research articles and include a thorough review of at least 50 references.

Reflection Papers: Presents results of completed research from an analytical, interpretative, or critical perspective on a specific topic using original sources. Structure: Title (in Spanish and Portuguese or English), Abstract and keywords (in Spanish and Portuguese or English), Introduction, Topic Development, Conclusions, and References.

Case Studies: Presents the results of a study on a particular situation, highlighting technical and methodological experiences from a specific clinical case. Includes a systematic annotated literature review of similar cases. Follows the same structure as a reflective article.

PUBLICATION PROCESS

All documents submitted for publication must be uploaded to the Open Journal System (OJS) platform. Manuscripts will be reviewed and approved by the Editorial Support Committee, which verifies compliance with author guidelines and assesses the quality of the information to determine acceptance or rejection. Accepted manuscripts are subjected to double-blind peer review to ensure a fair, honest, and ethical evaluation.

Reviewers must submit their evaluations using the designated format or as indicated by Open Journal Systems, considering criteria such as originality, relevance, timeliness, contributions, scientific rigor, and adherence to author guidelines. Evaluation outcomes may be:

Accepted: The manuscript meets all structural and content requirements and is forwarded to the Editorial Committee for final approval, style editing, and layout, with prior notification to the author.

Accepted with revisions: The manuscript requires modifications to meet the journal's standards. Once changes are made, the corresponding author must resubmit the revised manuscript for further evaluation by the Editorial Support Committee.

Rejected: The manuscript is formally declined.

Evaluation outcomes will be reviewed by the Editorial Committee, which will determine the feasibility and priority of publication.

Communication will be conducted directly and exclusively with the corresponding author, who will represent the author group and bear legal responsibility for the manuscript's content.

GENERAL MANUSCRIPT GUIDELINES

Manuscripts must not exceed 20 letter-sized pages (including figures, tables, and references), typed using a word processor. The text must indicate where each figure and/or table should be inserted. All illustrations (photos, diagrams, maps, and graphs) are considered figures and must be submitted in JPG or PNG format with a minimum resolution of 300 dpi to ensure legibility. Figure captions (with notes only if necessary) should be placed below the figure and be clear; table and figure numbers should be in bold, and titles in italics.

Scientific names must be italicized, with the genus capitalized and species lowercase (e.g., Bacillus subtilis, Escherichia coli). The full genus name should be written the first time it appears, thereafter using only the initial (e.g., B. subtilis, E. coli). Abbreviations such as sp., spp., etc., should not be italicized.

Use the Metric System for all measurements, leaving a space between the number and the unit, except for the percent (%) and currency (\$) symbols, which remain attached. Do not use periods after abbreviations (e.g., use "kg" not "kg."). When a unit applies to multiple numbers, it appears only after the final value (e.g., 2–4 kg).

Whole numbers up to nine should be written in words (e.g., one, two, nine); above that, use numerals with the unit (e.g., 1 cm, 200 m, 5 g, 20 ml). Decimals should use a comma (European format), and two decimal places are recommended. Use the European format for dates (e.g., 09 February 1997) and the 24-hour clock (e.g., 17:30 instead of 5:30 PM). Dimensions should be expressed as length and width (e.g., 4–5 mm long, not 4–5 mm in length; 3 mm wide, not 3 mm lat.).

MANUSCRIPT COMPONENTS

Manuscripts should be submitted in Microsoft Word, using Arial 12-point font, standard character spacing, letter-size paper, double-spaced lines and paragraphs (except for abstract, keywords, and references). It must include:

Title: In Spanish and English or Portuguese; centered, precise, informative, and ideally no more than 15 words.

Author(s): Full names separated by commas, with superscripts in italics indicating institutional affiliation. Academic degrees should follow, separated by commas. Each author's name must be followed by their ORCID code. The corresponding author should be marked with an asterisk.

Affiliations: Centered under the author names, beginning with the superscript number. Include full institutional affiliation, research group, and research line or seedbed.

ABSTRACT: Maximum 250 words in a single paragraph, clearly summarizing the problem, objectives, scope, methodology, results, and conclusions. Do not include abbreviations or references. Follow with 3–5 alphabetical keywords reflecting the manuscript content and defined using thesauri; keywords must not be repeated from the title. The abstract and keywords must also be provided in Portuguese or English.

INTRODUCTION: Title aligned to the left, in uppercase and bold. Clearly state the research purpose, supported by relevant literature. End with the main research objective.

METHODOLOGY: Title aligned left, uppercase, bold. Describe procedures used in the research, including context, population, statistical design, data analysis, and ethical considerations (for research involving humans, animals, or biodiversity). May include subheadings, aligned left, in lowercase italics, with new paragraphs for each.

RESULTS AND DISCUSSION: Title aligned left, uppercase, bold. Present and interpret findings, including comparisons and citations of other works. Limit to a maximum of five tables and/or figures. Use past tense.

CONCLUSIONS: Title aligned left, uppercase, bold. Provide a brief, non-speculative summary directly related to the research objectives.

REFERENCES: Must follow APA guidelines, which can be downloaded from the journal's website.

In-text citation guidelines

In-text references must follow the author–date citation system. When citing a source with a single author, the author's last name should be written as it appears in the reference list, followed by a comma and the year of publication (e.g., Estrada-Cely, 2019). For documents with two authors, both last names should be included, joined by the conjunction "and," followed by a comma and the year (e.g., Estrada-Cely and Espinosa-Nuñez, 2017). In cases where the source has three or more authors, only the first author's last name is used, followed by the Latin expression et al. and the year (e.g., Estrada et al., 2018). When multiple sources are cited to support the same idea, they must be listed in chronological order, separated by semicolons (e.g., Estrada-Cely, 2008; Estrada-Cely et al., 2017; Estrada-Cely, 2018).
